The face of hunger could easily be a familiar one. In fact, in virtually every U.S. community there are people who are impoverished and in need. Plainview is no exception.

U.S. Statistics indicate that ten million children struggling to learn and succeed in our schools are dealing with poor nutrition. The USDA defines "food insecure" as "a household where members are unable "to consistently access the

adequate amount of nutritious food necessary for a healthy life." More than 1 out of 4 (27.6%) of the children in Texas are classified as food insecure.

As educators, we know students who come to school without

breakfast often have a hard time concentrating on lessons. Prior to the district implementing the free breakfast in the classroom program, many teachers kept a supply of crackers or other small

snacks on hand for children who demonstrated physical symptoms such as stomachaches or headaches due to having missed breakfast.

The breakfast in the classroom program is making a difference, but have you ever wondered what happens to those same kids when the weekend rolls around.

The heartbreaking truth is that some of those kids spend the weekend hungry. We like to believe that the

Snack Pak 4 Kids founder Dyron



Howell, a pharmaceutical sales executive, recognized the problem of weekend hunger. After speaking to a school principal, he and his wife began the Snack Pak 4 Kids program in the kitchen of their home in Amarillo just before Labor Day weekend in 2010. They filled bags with nutritious weekend snacks for 10 kids that first weekend.

La Mesa teacher Susan Hurt is leading an advisory committee of interested community members to bring the Snack Pak 4 Kids program to Plainview ISD elementary schools in the fall of 2014.

Students participating will be referred by campus counselors. Food items will be discretely given to students as they leave the campus on Friday afternoons.

All food items will be new and high-quality. The only food that will be collected locally will be Poptarts and peanut butter. You can expect to see a peanut butter and/or Poptart drive this summer.

Monetary donations will be accepted. Donations to the





Plainview program can be made through the SP4K website at http://snackpak4kids.org 100% of donations will stay in this area and will be utilized for food purchases unless otherwise designated. The cost of providing snacks for one student is \$133 year (\$11 per month).

SP4K will need volunteers twice a month to sack the products and make deliveries to schools.

The local group has a Facebook page—Snack Pak for 4 Kids Plainview—where you can follow the program's implementation.





Engineering News

Katie Cox and Jamie Everett set a new PHS distance record for a mousetrap powered car. The old record was 152'2" and the new record is now 243'5". Students first researched mouse trap cars and then sketched their designs on paper. They used SolidWorks to design the individual components and then assemble the parts in the computer creating a 3D representation of the

car. The project is then transferred to



the laser cutter where the parts are cut from foam board or any light weight material. The car is t assembled by the team members and tested. The car is repeatedly tested and adjusted to get the maximum distance possible.

Students used STEM (Science, Technology, Engineering and Mathematics) to solve the problem: Science - kinetic and potential energy, and friction; Technology - 3D printing to build the wheel hubs and the laser cutter to cut the body; Engineering – SolidWorks computer-aided design software or CADD, to build and simulate the construction of the car.; Mathematics – gear ratios to calculate the possible travel distance before the car was built.

Students of Terry Nelson in the Engineering Design and Advanced Engineering Design classes will compete at the Top of Texas Career and Technical Education contest in May. Competitions will range from mouse trap cars, catapults, robotics, and computeraided design and manufacturing.

Middle School Intentional Acts of Kindness
