





Does technology impact student learning?

Recently I was asked what technologies Plainview ISD has available to teachers and how those technologies impact student learning. It's not an easy question to answer. Available technologies differ not only from school to school, but from classroom to classroom. The answer to the second half of that question— how it impacts student learning— is vital in assessing what we are doing, why we are doing it, and whether we should continue on the same course.

First let me say that I <u>am</u> an advocate of the use of new technologies in the classroom. In a utopia of unlimited funding, every teacher should have the opportunity to utilize any and all technology tools that complement our educational mission.

The problem is that technologies that are cool and cutting edge quickly become obsolete. Because of this, we need to use a great deal of discernment when deciding what to purchase so that expensive technologies do not wind up in storage cabinets because we have quickly moved on to something newer. It's also vital that we are on the same page when purchasing technologies to ensure that training and support are in place.

For many years researchers have followed the one-to-one computing initiatives that have been implemented in many districts. Somewhere in the future, all students will utilize devices to access curriculum and information. Plainview ISD is too large a district to fund an initiative like this with previous grant offerings and not wealthy enough to fund one with district funds.

When we look at student achievement (as measured by state assessments) from districts who have one-to-one initiatives - laptops or iPads—and compare it to districts who do not have these initiatives, it's obvious that technologies do not necessarily lead to improved learning.

If students use the devices to take notes from a teacher who is giving a lecture on an interactive whiteboard, it amounts to nothing more than the same old style instruction delivered with new and more expensive tools. We can't expect different results. There has to be more to lead to improved learning.

Real improvements through the use of technology take place when we make use of the assessment opportunities available with technology, utilize student data to plan meaningful instruction, focus on a more individualized student-centered learning environment, and consider options such as flipped learning, self-directed learning, and peer instruction.

Technologies are a huge opportunity to provide teachers with new sources of information about students' ideas, misconceptions, and questions.

Devices can help students to think critically, process new learning, convey that information to others, and visibly display mastery.

The goal is to achieve more meaningful teaching and learning, enhanced by the use of technology, so that our investment in technology is not wasted.
