Plainview High School, received a grant from the Lions Club. The funds will be used to purchase materials for a STEM (Science, Technology, Engineering, and Mathematics) project in kinematics - building a mousetrap car to explore forces, energy, transformations, momentum, and impulse.

Plainview High School, received a grant from the Soroptimist Club. She will use the funds to purchase a "Modeling Molecules of Life" kit. The kit will allow her ninth grade students to build and work with the biomolecules that exit in living organisms.

Alyse Lackey, La Mesa Elementary, received a grant from the Kiwanis Club. The funds will be used to purchase word building boards and organizational baskets for the guided reading program in her third grade classroom.

Kaci Lee, Hillcrest Elementary, received a grant from the Soroptimist Club. She will use the funds to purchase leveled sets of novels and book bins to use in her second grade classroom.

GenTx College Decision Day & Pass the Torch

Plainview High School participated in its 3rd Annual GenTX College Decision Day on

May 3, 2017.

GenTX celebrates the Class of 2017 as they publicly and officially announce their intent to pursue

postsecondary education through colleges, universities, trade schools, certification programs and the military.

As of May 3, 96% of the Senior class-306 of 320 students had been accepted for postsecondary education. The GenTX Day celebration included a seniors-only program in the PHS auditorium where students received information on what to do now that they have been accepted into college. Seniors were also asked to write a thank you note to someone who made a difference in their lives during their time at PHS. Students were then moved to the east gym to meet with their parents and/or family members prior to the official signing ceremony in the PHS main gymnasium.

The entire PHS student body, faculty and staff were in attendance to watch the signing ceremony and celebrate the honored seniors. Each PHS senior, escorted by parents or family members, was introduced along with their choice of postsecondary institution. Once all students were seated, they jointly signed a "Letter of Commitment", inspired by the letters of intent that

NCAA athletes sign when declaring their intent to compete at the college level.

The final part of the GenTX Day program was a drawing for prizes that included laptops, iPads, tablets, printers, microwaves, dorm-sized refrigerators, televisions, gift cards, and various other items that they can take with them to college.

The celebration continued on May 17, with the "Pass the Torch Day." All seniors who were eligible to participate in GenTX College Decision Day were also eligible to participate, voluntarily, in the "Pass the Torch Day" activities On May 17. The graduating seniors returned to one of the elementary or middle schools where interacted with younger students and encouraged them to pursue further education after high school.

Both programs are intended to promote and celebrate a college-going culture within our schools and city.


Ms. KHS, and has 21 dual credit hours.





