Additional seminars are being planned for the spring semester.





PHS hosts FTC Robotics Competition

The Plainview High School robotics team hosted First Tech Challenge teams from Dimmitt, Hart, Bushland and Kelton in the third and final league meet of this season.

This season, the PHS team is undefeated with a record of 15-0. According to the judges, this is the first time they ever recall a team going undefeated in area league competition.

For competition, teams must design a robot that can be operated both autonomously and with driver input. The first portion of competition is a 30-second period where the robot performs with out driver input. This is followed by a two-minute period where the driver controls the robot and attempts to score as many points as possible in the allotted time.

During the final portion of the competitions, the robot attempts to grab an object and lift it over a constructed wall.

Building a robot that can successfully accomplish the required tasks is a trial and error process. Students often devote afterschool and weekend hours in building the robot.

The PHS robotics instructor is Terry Nelson.

Edgemere 1st grade students publish books

Edgemere first grade students are now published authors.

First grade teachers, Chelsea Rushing, Jill Parish and Kathy Joy came up with the idea of a grade-level book publishing project during a planning session last October. Kathy, who had previously helped students publish a book, first shared the idea with the other teachers. Jill and Chelsea agreed that it would be a good way to teach their students proper writing and editing skills.

The book title they choose was, "When I Grow Up". Each student created a photo and a short written piece about what they want to be when they grow up and what they will do when they have that dream job.

The teachers taught the writing process and students worked through whole group lessons, independent



work, sometimes multiple rough drafts, and edited their pages in small groups until each student's two-page piece was ready to be published. Photos of each of the students is also included in the book. The final version of the books was sent to the printing company, Studentreasures Publishing. The company publishes the class book for free and allows parents to purchase a book if they would like a personal copy.

The classes received the printed books in early December.

"The books are really awesome," Chelsea said. "We are very pleased with how each class's book turned out. It was a really fun experience."



Edgemere fourth grade students "operate" on text

When you walk into a classroom of fourth grade students dressed in surgical caps, surgical masks and gloves, you might assume they are

in the midst of a science lesson. They are perhaps dissecting some small creature to build an understanding of how the parts of the body work together.

You might be surprised and a little puzzled when the teacher explains they are involved in a reading lesson on text features.

Dissection makes sense in science classes. It offers students a concrete, hands-on learning experience in

anatomy. It gives a real-world application to things students have read about in books. It allows students to look at how parts work together to function as a whole.

Edgemere Elementary fourth grade reading teacher Patti Hauk would argue that for those very same reasons, dissection makes sense in a reading class too.

Recognizing text features is one of the skills her students are required to master under the Texas Essential Knowledge and Skills

(TEKS). Hauk had taught lessons on the required text features and now felt students were ready to put their knowledge on display.

Giving students the opportunity to participate in "text feature surgery" was a fun way for students to dissect real

literature into the various parts of literature they had learned. It also gave her an opportunity to informally assess what her students knew about text features.

As the lesson began, Hauk explained that students would be "operating on" magazines and newspapers to find the different

text features that had been discussed previously in class. The text surgery would include identifying and clipping out headings, captions, tables, photos, diagrams, graphs, maps, timelines, sidebars, and types of print. Clippings were to be pasted into a booklet to use as a resource on text features.

The addition of surgical masks, caps and gloves made the assignment feel more important and added an element of fun for students.

The class "operating room" atmosphere was complete with an audio recording of a beating heart. Listening to the audio helped students to work quietly and complete the "operation" and build a collect of the text features during the 90-minute class period.

Hauk said the lesson wouldn't have been possible without the generosity of Covenant Health Plainview. They graciously donated masks, surgery hats, and gloves for the students.




