Spotlight on Staff: Rita Rodriguez

Thunderbird third grade teacher Rita Rodriguez is setting healthy living goals, for herself and her students, through the Unicef Kid Power band program.

Rita decided to apply for the program after receiving an email from Scholastic about a UNICEF grant that allows schools to receive a free Kid Power Kit funded by a donor.

The program runs from February to May. Each student receives his/her own personal Kid Power Band. The bands work as a watch and also count each students steps throughout the day.

Kids earn points based on the amount of steps they take. It takes approximately 2,400 steps to earn I point. Every I0 points earns a therapeutic food packet that UNICEF will send to malnourished kids.

"They are wanting to get up and move more which not only has a health benefit, but an educational benefit as well."

Rita said an added benefit is that the bands have helped her students become more empathetic.

"Through the program we are participating in 'Missions' and learning more about cultures around the world. The behavioral incentive comes into play with keeping them accountable for their choices. For example, if they are playing with their band during instructional time they will lose them for a certain amount of time. They want to be able to keep

their band on all day to earn points for the food packets."

She also gives students options that allow them to "earn" opportunities to go out and rack up more steps.

Rita says her students "love participating in the program" and she encourages other interested teachers to sign up for the mailing list at http://schools.unicefkidpower.org/

to be informed of the next opportunity to apply.

Rita, a first year teacher, grew up in Plainview and is a 2004 graduate of PHS. She is the daughter of Oscar Rodriguez and Minga Rodriguez (Highland). She has one sister, Sarah.

Rita earned a bachelor of science degree (Biology/Chemistry) from Wayland Baptist University and a master's degree in forensic science from the University of New Haven.

"After not having much luck find a job in the forensic science field, I started to really think about why that could be the case. I started to think that there must be a reason that I am still working with children and that I needed to fulfill that purpose," she said explaining her decision to go into the teaching field.

"I have enjoyed getting to know my students as well as working with so many amazing teachers throughout the year. Not only am I learning so much from my team here at Thunderbird, I learned a lot in my four years as a paraprofessional, and from all the people that I worked closely with during those years, that has helped me tremendously."

She adds that she often thinks back to many of her teachers and why she thought they were great teachers.

"I try to use those characteristics in my classroom," she said.

"I am a new member of AAAS – The American Association for the Advancement of Science. I joined the organization because I am a strong believer in science education and I want to take what I can learn from the organization and apply it to the classroom."

In her free time, she enjoys reading traveling, and watching the San Antonio Spurs.

So what's on her bucket list?

"I want to step foot in every state as well as every continent," she said.

Humberto's session highlighted some of the successful strategies that Plainview ISD's Migrant Education Program is using in offering unique services to the migrant students in our district. Humberto also shared some of the activities the Plainview Migrant program utilizes to reach out to parents and encourage their attendance at parent meetings and their involvement in the education of their children. He shared with those in attendance how we use the APEX program for credit accrual and tutorial purposes for those students needing to pass the STAAR.

Humberto had previously been a presenter at the Region 17 RSD MEP Update session on January 31.

Humberto, a great role model and mentor for young people, was also the guest speaker for Estacado's recent NJHS induction ceremony. He spoke on perseverance, sharing that he once had a coach and mentor that started each day by saying "a journey of a thousand miles begins with the first step."

"It meant there was a new season, a team to bond with, trust to create, goals to accomplish, but it all



started in the beginning with one step," he said. "There is a process. Many of you aspire to do great things, but we cannot set goals and just get there. There is a journey we must follow. There are things we must do. People we must encounter in order for us to get to the end...like any journey, your path will not be straight and it will not be easy. There are twists and turns along the way."

2017 LaVern Roach Nominees

Ten Plainview High School seniors were nominated for the 2017 Lavern Roach Memorial Award, the most prestigious honor given to a male graduating senior.

The award, determined by popular vote of the student body, is named in honor of Lavern Roach, a 1943 PHS graduate and welterweight boxing champion who died from injuries received in the ring in 1950. Roach's widow, Evelyn Roach Trice, established the award in 1950 to promote clean living, good citizenship and sportsmanship.
