## Board of Trustees approves pay increase for staff

Recently a school district made the news for passing out \$1000 bonus checks to employees during Convocation. You may have seen the story; it went viral on Facebook and it brought a lot of publicity to the school district.

I am very appreciative that our school board did not choose to give us a bonus check. Instead, they chose to give us a salary increase. A salary increase is not just a one time boost to our bank accounts as a bonus would have been. A raise in pay means we will continue to receive those dollars in the years ahead.

Over the last several years when raises are being considered, our Administration has recommended to the Board of Trustees that all employees be given an equal dollar amount increase rather than the percentage raise many school boards approve.

With a percentage raise, those on the high end of the salary scale receive more than those on low end. For example when a board approves a 2% raise, that translates to a \$400 increase for a person making \$20,000 a year and a \$1600 increase for a person who makes \$80,000 a year.

This is my 27th year with Plainview ISD and for most of those years when we were given a raise, it was a percentage raise. This type of raise is common practice in most districts, but thankfully, it is not how our current Board has granted salary increases.

Our Board "gets it" and is concerned that no matter where we fall on the salary schedule, we all face rising costs for housing, groceries, utilities, and especially our health insurance.

This year the Board once again voted to increase our salary \$1200. It doesn't matter if you are the Superintendent or the lowest paid employee in Plainview ISD, you will receive the same dollar amount increase in salary.

If you see a Board member, please take time to thank him or her. They have a tough job and truly care about not only the success of our schools, but the prosperity of this community. Our appreciation is the only pay they receive for their service.

## Pam Tillman: The Battle She Didn't Choose

October is Breast Cancer Awareness Month, an annual campaign to raise awareness of the disease.

Breast cancer is the second most common kind of cancer in women. Statistics say about 1 in 8 women born today in the United States will have breast cancer at some point.

We probably all know someone who is fighting breast cancer. In fact it's difficult to think back to a time when you didn't know someone who was fighting cancer. It's especially hard when the diagnosis hits one of our own.

Hillcrest teacher Pam Tillman is one of us in the fight for her life against breast cancer.

Pam was diagnosed on March 17. She had no history of cancer in her family; no reason to think that a diagnosis was on the horizon.

She first noticed a bruising on her breast that didn't go away after two weeks. That was followed by the discovery of a lump and an immediate trip to have a mammogram. Her doctor told her then that he was pretty sure it was cancer.

Pam says she drove back to school that day, crying all the way from Covenant Hospital to Hillcrest where she went straight to Hillcrest principal Yesenia Pardo's office.

"We cried and prayed together," she said.

Two weeks later, the oncologist told her it was Stage 3 breast cancer.

"I had the best kind of cancer," she said. "But we needed to get aggressive. My doctors immediately went to work developing a plan for treatment."

"On Friday, September 15, I completed five months of chemotherapy. The next step will

is not

be to have surgery and radiation."

Pam is not one to dwell on the negative, but focuses on the positive side of what has happened since her diagnosis.

"I have been very blessed in my journey. I have had minimal side effects," she said. "I have worked most days since the first of school. I have amazing doctors and support from my school, the parents of my kiddos, my family, and GOD."

Pam teaches a special education speech communication class at Hillcrest. She took her current position in the Spring of 2015. Prior to that time, she had worked as a substitute teacher since 2010.


Feeling the need to be present in the classroom, but knowing your health has to be a priority can be challenging.

"My kids are mostly autistic and change is very hard for them," she said. "My assistant, James Harris, has stepped up and helped me so much."

She does acknowledge that the need to focus on treatment has created some struggles in her day to day life.

"The bills are crazy and I have NO time off."

### La Mesa hosts "Sock it to Harvey" Drive

In the aftermath of Hurricane Harvey, Texans young and old have pulled together to help in what will be a long-term recovery. La Mesa Elementary staff and students wanted to take part in those recovery efforts and found a unique way to extend a helping hand.

The campus reached out to Magnolia Elementary in Magnolia - a city within the Houston metropolitan area.

La Mesa principal Vickie Young had become acquainted with Magnolia Elementary principal Lettie Roman during a summer leadership conference at Harvard University a few years ago.

Young made a phone call to Roman to inquire how her campus could best support the recovery for the Magnolia school. Roman reported that the school building had suffered some leaks, but had received minimal damage following the hurricane. Her biggest concern was for the students whose families had suffered property losses due to flooding in the area.

Together, the two principals decided that collecting new packages of socks and underwear might be the best way the Plainview students could show support for the

On August 30, La Mesa excitedly launched their "Sock it to Harvey" Drive over social media. Notes were also sent home to parents explaining the drive.

Almost immediately, new packages of socks and underwear began to pour into the donation box not only from La Mesa families, but from members of the community who heard about the drive and wanted to participate.

In little more than a week, the campus had collected approximately 155 lbs. of new socks and underwear.

Young says that's when Larson Manufacturing stepped in to help.

The company volunteered to pack the items into heavy-duty boxes for shipping and offered to pay the shipping costs.

The boxes were packed on Tuesday, supplemented with notes of encouragement from the La Mesa students, and are now on their way to the Magnolia school.

The successful campaign to "Sock it to Harvey" was not only a great way to support those in need, but also a good lesson in philanthropy for the Plainview students.



#### District counselors planning Parent Seminars

After conducting an online survey of parents to determine the parents' interest in learning more information on a number of topics, the Plainview ISD counselors are in process of creating parent seminars based on those results.




