# Ash High students tour TTHSC

A group of students from Ash High School had the opportunity to tour the Texas Tech Health Sciences Center (TTHSC) during a TTU Red Bag Tour on March 7. Students were selected for the opportunity based on grades, behavior, and attendance, and a desire to have a career in the health field.

The selected students have career interests that include occupations such as doctors, nurses, phlebotomists, physical therapist, and other careers that might be possible through TTHSC.

During the tour, students visited the SIMs Center where nurses and doctors practice medical procedures on realistic dummies, listen to recorded irregular heartbeats, and view virtual scans of

the inside of a real human body.

Students also toured the human anatomy lab where first year medical students dissect cadavers donated to the medical school.

The professor in charge talked to the touring students about the curriculum and requirements for medical students. He offered his own words of advice to those interested in a career in the health field.

The Ash students also visited a cancer research lab where thousands of different cancers are housed in large nitrogen tanks. They learned that the TTHSC students who work there oversee the preserving



and testing of the different cancers, assisting in the effort to find cures for cancer.

The Alzheimer's and Brain research Center allowed students the chance to see a real human brain and to view the physical effects that Alzheimer can have.

Finally, the students attended an organization fair where they talked to representatives from each branch of the TTHSC and asked questions.

This opportunity gave our students the chance to practically see what it could be like to pursue a career in the health field, and have fun while doing it.









#### Nelda McQuien Laney Award established

Following a vote by the PHS student body, Plainview High School graduating senior Trini Perez was named as the first recipient of the Nelda McQuien Laney Award.

The award, established this year in memory of the "First Lady of West Texas" Nelda McQuien Laney, recognizes a senior girl who is in good standing at PHS, exhibits the traits of leadership and good citizenship, and is involved in student organizations at Plainview High School.

Nelda Laney, a graduate of Plainview High School and Texas Tech University, was married to former Speaker of the Texas House of Representatives James "Pete" Laney.

Nelda Laney was involved in numerous organization including Kappa Alpha Theta, the Omega Delphi Study Club, and Caprock District Women's Club. She served as co-chair of the Capitol Fund Drive, which raised private funds for furnishing the renovated Texas Capitol, and as vice chair of the Texas Capitol Restoration Celebration. Nelda was honored with the Lauro F.

Cavazos Award, TTU College of Education Distinguished Alumni and was the first recipient of the Woman of Achievement Award from the Texas Federation

of Women's Clubs. She also received a Special Recognition for her work on the Capitol Restoration by the Texas Women's Alliance and was a recipient of the Star of Texas Preservation Award for Capitol Restoration. She was named Woman of the Year in Plainview and Hale Center.

Trini Perez, the daughter of Johnny and Carmen Perez, plans to attend college and major in mass communications and public relations with a minor in education. She is a member of the PHS band where she serves as a color guard captain and is the reporter for the band leadership team. She serves as captain of the



softball team and played on the volleyball team as a freshman. She is a Symphony Guild debutante, 2nd vice-president for Student Council, Public Relations Officer for FCCLA (Family Career and Community Leaders of America), and an active member of St. Alice Catholic Church.

Nominees for this year's award, in addition to Trini Perez, were Jaylee Campos, Dareli Chavez, Anahi Cordero, Bethany Gamez, Lucy Hernandez, Mahogany Nails, Lauren Pritchard, Tabbatha Riojas, and Yasmine Soto. Nominees were selected by vote of the senior class.

#### 2018 LaVern Roach Nominees

Plainview High School senior Patrick Ceniseros was selected from 10 nominees as the 68th recipient of the LaVern Roach Award, the most prestigious recognition and the highest honor given to PHS male graduating seniors.

The award memorializes world-renowned welterweight boxing champ LaVern Roach, a 1943 PHS graduate who died in 1950 from injuries received during a boxing match in New York City. Roach's widow, Evelyn Roach Trice, established the award after his death to promote the lifestyle her husband embodied -- clean living, good citizenship and sportsmanship.

The ten nominees for the award were selected by a vote of the senior class. The recipient was termined by vote of the entire PHS student body.

Ceniseros's name will be added to a plaque at PHS that bears the name of previous



recipients. He will also be honored by the Pliew Lion's Club, which administers the award.

Ceniseros, the son of Rosalie Longoria and Oscar Longoria, plans to attend Texas A & M University, Corpus Christi, where he will major in marine biology. He played varsity tennis at PHS and participated in band, A Cappella choir, and DECA.

Nominees for the award, in addition to Ceniseros, were Jaylon Borrego, Benjamin Bozeman, Andres Garcia, Joseph, Carson Hauk, Adrian Hinojosa, Jimmy Phan, Octavius Vera, and Edgar Zamarripa.

### lementary students vote for Texas Bluebonnet Award



Sixty-four Plainview ISD elementary students were among 141,141 Texas students in third, fourth, fifth and sixth grades to cast a vote to determine

which children's book would receive the coveted 2017 Texas Bluebonnet Award (TBA).

The winning book is selected from a Texas Bluebonnet Award master list of 20 books chosen by the TBA selection committee and released at the Texas Book Festival each October.

The nominated books, fiction and nonfiction, must have been written in the last three years by an author who resides and publishes in the United States. The committee also considers student interests, relevant content, reputable reviews and literary quality when selecting books to place on the nominating list.

Once the books are selected, school librarians across Texas register to participate in the voting process and place the books in the campus libraries for students to access.

According to district librarian Susan Flippin, the award helps encourage reading for pleasure. Flippin adds that many students seem enthusiastic about participating in the voting and she hopes to see the program grow.

"I would love to see more voters as I believe these books represent a wide range of genres and there is interest for all. I am always looking for ways to challenge more to take up the Bluebonnet challenge and hope for the number of voters to climb

each year in our schools," said Flippin. "These books are for students in grades 3-6. I believe we could and should have 100 percent voting. That's the goal."

Students qualify to cast individual votes by reading at least five books. The students have almost a year to read the nominated books and most students choose to read more than the required number.

"Each student keeps a reading map of the books they have read," said Flippin.

"They also either write a summary, take a reading quiz over the book, or answer questions asked by the library assistant at each campus."

Voting for the Plainview students took place the week of Jan. 22-30.

"All voting has to take place by Jan. 31 so we wait until the last week of January to vote to give the students as much time as we can to read," explains Flippin.

Votes are then submitted to the state committee for tabulation. Local students who participated in voting received certificates, a bluebonnet pencil, and a Texas-shaped bookmark at post-voting parties. These parties take place either at the time of voting or when the winner is announced depending upon the campus.

"Texas has many reading lists for different age

groups, and there are programs planned for other grade levels, but the Bluebonnet Award is the oldest and the only one that students select the winner," Flippin said. "Any author you talk to will tell you it is a coveted award because the kids chose, not the adults. Every author wants to win a Texas Bluebonnet Award."

The title of the winning book, "The Last Kids on Earth," was announced on Feb. 16. The Bluebonnet Award will be presented to the authors, Max Brallier, during the Texas Library Association Annual Conference each April.

Flippin said most of the Plainview students this year voted for the winning book. Statewide there were 22,757 votes for "The Last Kids on Earth." Second place went to "The Great Pet Escape" by Victoria Jamieson and third place went to "Whoosh!" by Chris Barton and Don Tate.

"I am thrilled with the students who participated in this year's voting," said Flippin. "I thank each one of them for their commitment to reading the Bluebonnet nominees."

Those interested in reading this year's nominated books can find a complete list of the books on the Texas Library Association website under the Reading List section.

According to Flippin, the process of selecting next year's Bluebonnet award

winner is already underway. The 2018-2019 nominated books are arriving on the campuses and all campuses should have the books available for checkout in late March.

In order to build students interest in award winning books, Flippin also has implemented a "Texas 2 x 2" reading program for students age 2 to second grade. Although this is a local program only, this group of students has been asked to read (or be read to) ten books from a list of 20 recommended books in order to receive their certificate. Fourteen students qualified to vote for their favorite book. The winner was "I Will Not Eat You" by Adam Lehrhaupt.

Students in middle school and high school have the opportunity to participate in another local initiative, the "Lone Star" reading program. Flippin says these older students will be voting on a favorite book from their reading list in April.
